Session 1	To begin to find out who the ancient Greeks were, and place their civilisation in time	Become familiar with some of the different ages, or periods, of ancient Greece. Apply this knowledge to complete a timeline showing important information about, or the main events of, each age or period. Challenge as pair or group activity to answer as many questions about the different ages or periods of ancient Greece as they can. Session 2	To understand the different types of government in ancient Greece	Explore the three main types of government of ancient Greece: monarchy, oligarchy and democracy. Discuss the advantages and disadvantages of two of these types of government: monarchy and democracy. As a greek character put yourself in their shoes and consider their thoughts and feelings about the type of government they live under. Complete a +/- grid about the types of government. Session 5	To know about religion in ancient Greece	Find out about the polytheistic religion of ancient Greece, and the important role the gods and goddesses played in everyday life, from worshipping and festivals to helping to explain natural events through the telling of myths. Independently find out more about the twelve Olympians, and make own mini-booklet about the twelve Olympians. Or create own story/film about a greek hero and a monster. Session 7	To know how modern-day life has been influenced by the ancient Greeks	Explore the legacy of ancient Greece. Find out about some of the many ways that ancient Greek ideas and developments still influence our lives today. In groups, take part in a carousel activity where they will find out about and discuss the legacy of the ancient Olympic Games, the Greek language, Greek myths, and Greek government.
