It is important that your grant is used effectively and based on school need. The <u>Education Inspection Framework</u> makes clear there will be a focus on 'whether leaders and those responsible for governors all understand their respective roles and perform these in a way that enhances the effectiveness of the school'.

Under the <u>Quality of Education</u> Ofsted inspectors consider: **Intent** - Curriculum design, coverage and appropriateness **Implementation** - Curriculum delivery, Teaching (pedagogy) and Assessment **Impact** - Attainment and progress

To assist schools with common transferable language this template has been developed to utilise the same three headings which should make your plans easily transferable between working documents.

Schools must use the funding to make **additional and sustainable** improvements to the quality of Physical Education, School Sport and Physical Activity (PESSPA) they offer. This means that you should use the Primary PE and sport premium to:

- Develop or add to the PESSPA activities that your school already offer
- Build capacity and capability within the school to ensure that improvements made now will benefit
  pupils joining the school in future years
- The Primary PE and sport premium should not be used to fund capital spend projects; the school's budget should fund these.

This document will help you to review your provision and to report your spend. DfE encourages schools to use this template as an effective way of meeting the reporting requirements of the Primary PE and Sport Premium. We recommend you start by reflecting on the impact of current provision and reviewing the previous spend.

Schools are required to <u>publish details</u> of how they spend this funding, including any under-spend from 2021/2022, as well as on the impact it has on pupils' PE and sport participation and attainment. **All funding must be spent by 31st July 2023.** We recommend regularly updating the table and publishing it on your website throughout the year. This evidences your ongoing self-evaluation of how you are using the funding to secure maximum, sustainable impact. 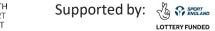

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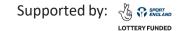

Year 2 Swimming. To address concerns that approximately half of children within the Winterton Federation are not at national swimming standard by the end of Year 6. To give young children in a town that is 6 miles from a local swimming pool the opportunity to develop this important life skill.	Organise pool time and transport.
